ASC to Hold Conference in San Francisco

The American Society of Criminology (ASC) will hold its annual meeting November 19–22, 2014, in San Francisco, California, at the San Francisco Marriott Marquis. The theme for the meeting is “Criminology at the Intersections of Oppression.” Seven major areas of study include: Causes of Crime and Criminal Behavior; Types of Offending and Victimization; Correlates of Crime and Oppression; Criminal Justice Policy and Practice; Perceptions of Crime and Justice; Comparative and Historical Perspectives; and Methodology. In addition to regular sessions, there will be roundtable, poster, “author meets critics,” and “professional development/students meet scholars” sessions. Program Co-Chairs are **Bonita M. Veysey** (Rutgers University) and **Robert Apel** (Rutgers University). ASC-sponsored workshops will be held the Tuesday prior to the meeting on Analysis of Large, Publicly Available Datasets, instructed by **Lynn Addington** (American University); Qualitative and Mixed Methods Research for Beginners, instructed by **Michael Birzer** (Wichita State University); and Regression Models for Time Series Analysis, instructed by **David McDowall** (University at Albany).

Author Victor Kappeler Assists White House

Serial Homicide Collaborative Brings Research Data Together

Enzo Yaksic is working to make serial homicide offender data widely accessible to both academic researchers and law enforcement professionals. His unprecedented initiative, the Serial Homicide Expertise and Information Sharing Collaborative (SHEISC), was formed in 2010.

Yaksic, acting as database coordinator, built a network comprised of those with experience maintaining serial homicide datasets. Each member of the network, **Mike Aamodt, James Alan Fox, Eric Hickey, Ronald Hinch, Brigadier Gérard Labuschagne, Jack Levin, Janet McClellan, Bryan Nelson, Michael Newton, Kenna Quinet, and John White**, compiled and contributed their own data to one central location: the SHEISC Joint Serial Killer Database. In 2013, this dataset was merged with the Radford/FGCU [Florida Gulf Coast University] Serial Killer Database Research Project to bolster the creation of a national serial homicide offender database.

The collective mission of the SHEISC is twofold: to assist academic researchers and law enforcement professionals in reaching a greater understanding of atypical killers and to bridge the gap between current thought and practice through open communication, information sharing, and informed discussion.

In 2012, the Multidisciplinary Collaborative on Sexual Crime and Violence (MCSCV) was instituted as the official communication arm of the SHEISC. To facilitate dialogue, a private e-mail listserv, and LinkedIn group are utilized.

Over the past 40 years, general knowledge of serial killers has been primarily derived from self-selected sources, such as offender interviews and case studies. A

lack of collaboration led to the influence of anecdotal evidence on public statements made about serial killers. According to Yaksic, a burgeoning “serial murder industry” amplifies these myths and stereotypes, packaging them as entertainment, and the “true crime” genre has fostered a new generation of researchers that promulgate similar falsehoods. The SHEISC utilizes technology as a medium for disseminating knowledge. It has been instrumental in transcending institutionalized rivalries and contributes to the greater good by helping to find solutions to a persistent societal problem.

SHEISC discussions cover a wide range of issues, from changing offender demographics and cold cases to the influence of genetics and environmental factors on serial killers. A Serial Homicide Digest, which catalogs various events related to serial murder, is disseminated to the group. Members also share scholarly journal articles through a literature repository made possible through a partnership with the Center for Homicide Research.

One real-world success of the collaborative is the arrest of suspected serial killer Felix Vail. In this case, the SHEISC was used to connect the investigative agent with personnel at the federal behavioral analysis unit, an intervention that was critical to the positive outcome of the case.

The SHEISC represents the first successful construction of a collaborative environment for researchers and law enforcement professionals to communicate jointly on the topic of serial homicide. Find out more by visiting their blog at: <http://serialhomicidecollaborative.blogspot.com/>

American Judicature Society Dissolving

The American Judicature Society (AJS) is dissolving after 101 years. The work of AJS has focused primarily on judicial ethics, judicial selection, access to justice, criminal justice reform, and the jury system. Founded in 1913 as part of the progressive movement, responding to demands for legal reform, AJS helped popularize the “Missouri plan” for merit selection of judges.

Several law schools have housed the organization, most recently Drake University and Vanderbilt University. The American Judicature Society created the Center for Judicial Independence in 1997 in response to an increase in criticism and efforts to remove from the bench judges who have

issued unpopular rulings. Since the Center was established, it has promoted judicial independence by educating the public through its programs, activities, and website. AJS’s other centers include the Elmo B. Hunter Citizens Center for Judicial Selection, the Center for Judicial Ethics, the National Jury Center, and the Center for Forensic Science and Public Policy.

Upon dissolution, the society’s Center for Judicial Ethics will be transferred to the National Center for State Courts, and new homes are being sought for *Judicature* magazine and for a database on judicial selection in the states.



Program Development

College of New Rochelle

The College of New Rochelle (New York) School of Arts and Sciences has announced a new certificate program in Forensic Science. The Forensic Studies Certificate is a 15-credit program that combines classroom, laboratory, and experiential learning opportunities to provide students with the knowledge, skills, and experiences to understand the role of scientific investigation in today's law enforcement and criminal justice sectors. Coursework begins with a Fundamentals of Forensic Science class, which incorporates lectures and laboratory work emphasizing the application of science to the examination of physical evidence obtained in the investigation of a crime. Later course topics include the crime scene, collection of physical evidence, fingerprints, firearms, trace evidence, and DNA analysis. Students in the Forensics Program are also required to complete coursework in political science (Law and the Courts), psychology (Abnormal Psychology), and sociology (Criminology), which provides a broad background in issues related to crime. Drawing on the students' prior coursework, the program culminates in the completion of a capstone project during junior or senior year, such as an internship or field experience in a law enforcement setting, a laboratory research project investigating new or controversial techniques in forensic analysis, or an in-depth research project on a contemporary issue in forensic science. Kilgore College

The Kilgore College (Texas) Board of Trustees has recently approved reviving the Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree in Criminal Justice, beginning in Fall 2014. The program is designed for students who enter the program upon high school graduation, as well as nontraditional students who want to be a part of the program after graduation from the Basic Peace Officer Course. This program is also designed to increase enrollment opportunities for students who are currently deployed on active military duty. The program was terminated in 2005 because of a short-lived push by the Commission on Law Enforcement in the early 2000s, which attempted to require a bachelor's degree for basic licensure. New students who successfully complete the four-semester, 60-hour program will graduate with an associate's degree in criminal justice and will hold the certification necessary to become peace officers in the state of Texas. This new degree will fall under the Business, Technology, Language Development and Public Services Division. The program is designed to be practitioner-focused rather than theory-focused. St. Louis University

Saint Louis University (SLU) is expanding its offerings in the field of criminology and criminal justice with a new Master of Science (MS) degree in Criminology and Professional Practice. The degree is offered by the Criminology and Criminal Justice program, located in the School of Social Work within the College for Public Health and Social Justice. The MS in Criminology and Professional Practice builds on the strengths of the interdisciplinary nature of the college and School of Social Work, and will prepare graduates to be advanced practitioners in a variety of community settings, taking many different approaches to the nature of crime and justice.

The MS will feature three concentration areas: administration of justice, treatment and rehabilitation, and emergency response, giving students a more in-depth focus in their studies. The program offers multiple course delivery formats to assist students who are working full- or part-time, and will include evening and some online courses within the emergency response concentration. University of the Sunshine Coast

Increasing interest in the policies, research, and practices surrounding the prevention and detection of crime has prompted Queensland, Australia's University of the Sunshine Coast (USC) to offer a Bachelor degree focused on criminology. Starting in 2015, USC's Bachelor of Criminology and Justice degree will feature new courses in homicide, criminal profiling, and youth justice, among others. Lecturer in Justice and Legal Studies **Anna Bishop**, a solicitor and academic, will be coordinating the program. Like the school's previous degree in Justice and Legal Studies, the degree is designed to be used as an entrance into policing or corrective services, but it is also a stepping stone to career options in forensics, specialist law enforcement agencies, customs and border protection, youth justice, and research and policy. University of Washington, Tacoma

The newest criminal justice degree at the University of Washington (UW) Tacoma is an all-online major designed by social work faculty, the first all-online major at the school. UW Tacoma is the only UW campus that offers a criminal justice degree. A campus-based CJ major was inaugurated in the fall of 2010, and graduated its first students in June of 2012. The online and campus-based programs both are created and administered by UW Tacoma's Social Work Program. Eight faculty teach CJ courses and help guide the program's development. Setting the program apart from others is the involvement of faculty with a social work background in a criminal justice program. While most criminal justice degrees emphasize a law enforcement or legal approach, this program takes a broad look at the human impact of crime on perpetrators and victims. The online criminal justice program will be a "cohort-based" model, meaning students will proceed through the program in groups, forming bonds through study groups, a sense of community, and a strong team-based learning experience. Research Center on Violence at West Virginia University

The Department of Sociology and Anthropology at West Virginia University (WVU) has launched the Research Center on Violence. The Center will earn grants to work on government and nonprofit projects, host colloquia with leading speakers on violence, reach out and interact with West Virginia and national communities, and play a key role in attracting Ph.D. students from across the world. Currently composed of six WVU sociology and anthropology staff members, the Center will examine violence, broadly defined, from interpersonal violence, such as robbery or rape, to crimes against the environment.

Routledge (Anderson Publishing) author **Walter DeKeseredy**, Anna Deane Carlson Endowed Chair of Social Sciences at West Virginia University, will serve as the director of the Center. Well established in his field, DeKeseredy has published 19 books and more than 140 peer-review journal articles and book chapters and has received large-scale U.S. and Canadian federal grants. He is routinely asked to serve as a consultant to the U.S. Justice Department and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and has served with the LaMarsh Center for Research on Violence and Conflict Resolution at York University in Toronto, Canada. He was named the winner of the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences Section on Critical Criminal Justice's 2014 top award for scholarship, and is a former co-winner of the Distinguished Scholar Award from the American Society of Criminology's Division of Women and Crime. **Amanda Sanchez** is the Center's Post-Doctoral Fellow.

The Center's staff members will research some of the biggest issues affecting communities across the nation, including rape, robbery, and crimes against the environment. Experts will try to learn everything they can about violence in order to help prevent it with the help of government grants and nonprofit projects. The Center has plans to expand to become more interdisciplinary, and will include members from public health, medicine, and psychology.

In celebration of the new Research Center on Violence, WVU announced the 2014-15 Mary L. Thomas Lecture Series featuring presentations by **Donald Black, Randall Collins, Joseph Donnermeyer, Kyle Mulrooney, Claire Renzetti, Katinka van de Ven, and Margaret Zahn**. Established by a gift by alumna **Mary L. Thomas** in 1992, the Mary L. Thomas Endowment supports the Department of Sociology and Anthropology and the Department of English to support lectureships, colloquia, symposia, or seminars alternating biennially between both departments.

Crime and Justice Summer Research Institute

The Crime and Justice Summer Research Institute on "Broadening Perspectives and Participation" will be held July 6-24, 2015, at Ohio State University's Criminal Justice Research Center in Columbus, Ohio, with **Ruth D. Peterson** as director. The institute may be of interest to faculty pursuing tenure and career success in research-intensive institutions, academics transitioning from teaching to research institutions, and faculty members carrying out research in teaching contexts. Funded by the National Science Foundation, the institute is designed to promote successful research projects and careers among faculty from underrepresented groups working in areas of crime and criminal justice. Participants work to complete an ongoing project (either a research paper or grant proposal) in preparation for journal submission or agency funding review. Participants also gain information tailored to successful navigation of the academic setting. The Summer Research Institute provides participants with: resources for completing their research projects; senior faculty mentors in their areas of study; opportunities to network with junior and senior scholars; and workshops addressing topics related to publishing, professionalization, and career planning. Travel expenses, housing in Columbus, and living expenses are also included. The institute culminates in a research symposium in which participants present their completed research before a national audience of faculty and graduate students.

Applicants must hold regular tenure-track positions in U.S. institutions and demonstrate how their participation broadens participation of underrepresented groups in crime and justice research. In Memoriam

William J. Chambliss

William J. (Bill) Chambliss, Professor of Sociology at the George Washington University, died in February of this year. Chambliss was a leading force in the fields of criminology and the sociology of law. Chambliss began his academic career as an undergraduate studying with Donald Cressey at UCLA and in 1986 moved to George Washington University, where he co-directed the Institute on Crime, Justice, and Corrections. Chambliss received many professional awards, including both the Sutherland Award for Outstanding Contributions to Criminology and the Major Achievement Award from the American Society of Criminology (ASC); the Lifetime Achievement Award for Contributions in Criminal Justice from the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS); the Lifetime Achievement Award from both the Criminology and Sociology of Law sections of the American Sociological Association (ASA); and the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Society for the Study of Social Problems (SSSP) section on Law and Society. He also served as president of both ASC and SSSP. In 2012, SSSP created the William J. Chambliss Lifetime Achievement Award. Look for events in tribute to Chambliss at the November 2014 meeting of the American Society of Criminology.

Truett A. Ricks

Truett A. Ricks, a leader in law enforcement circles, died in May of this year at the Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Lexington, Kentucky. Ricks spent 14 years as Dean of the Eastern Kentucky University College of Law Enforcement, now known as the College of Justice and Safety. He also worked as Associate Dean and Professor in the college. Beginning in 1975, he spent two years as Commissioner of the Kentucky State Police under then-Governor Julian Carroll. During his tenure as Commissioner, Ricks implemented the promotional procedure that was enacted and still in place today. Ricks began his career in 1953 as a clerk for the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, DC. While serving as a patrol officer, and Detective Sergeant with the Memphis, Tennessee, Police Department, he received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Memphis; then, while working as an assistant professor at Florida State University, he earned a doctorate. Ricks wrote several textbooks on physical security. *Principles of Security and Crime Prevention* was published by Anderson Publishing (the fourth edition in 2000, with Clifford Van Meter and Pamela Collins). In retirement, he worked as a consultant.

Austin T. Turk

Austin T. Turk, a renowned advocate of conflict criminology, passed away in February of this year. His book *Criminality and Legal Order*, first published in 1969, is considered a classic in the field. Turk's scholarly career spanned more than five decades. He joined the Department of Sociology faculty at the University of California, Riverside, in 1988, and served on a host of boards and committees. He was a Fellow and Past President of the American Society of Criminology (ASC), and had also been Chair of the Criminology Section of the American Sociological Association (ASA). In the community of Riverside, he was an avid supporter of the Citizens' University Committee and also volunteered with the Riverside Police Department. A special issue of Routledge's *Police Practice and Research: An International Journal* (Volume 15, Issue 5), published in July, was dedicated to him. Look for events in tribute to Turk at the November 2014 meeting of the American Society of Criminology.

NIJ Research Assistantship

The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) has a Research Assistantship Program (RAP) designed to support criminal justice research. It also helps attract highly qualified doctoral students to graduate programs in criminal justice and the field of criminal justice research. Under the RAP, NIJ provides financial support to participating universities for costs associated with research assistants enrolled in criminal justice degree programs who then work at NIJ and participate in NIJ's criminal justice research activities.

NIJ is undertaking efforts to nurture and grow the pool of researchers involved in criminal justice research as well as activities that support the research endeavor itself. These efforts include increasing resources devoted to supporting graduate education for persons pursuing a career in criminology and criminal justice studies and other disciplines engaged in research on and teaching about criminal justice topics. NIJ's efforts to build the research field and support the research endeavor include support of research assistantships.

These assistantships involve working with staff at NIJ (and other federal partners and collaborators) on research and evaluation studies. NIJ is currently conducting outreach to a number of research-based doctoral programs and associations across the U.S. where doctoral students may be interested in applying for these assistantships. The NIJ only accepts RAP applicant packets where the student's graduate program director (GPD) has agreed to nominate the student. Routledge Author Rosemary Barberet Wins Dual Awards

Routledge author **Rosemary Barberet** has won two awards for her book with Routledge, *Women, Crime and Criminal Justice: A Global Enquiry*. The book is the recipient of the 2014 Distinguished Book Award by the Division of International Criminology of the American Society Criminology (ASC), and has also been awarded the 2015 Outstanding Book Award by the International Section of the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS). Barberet will receive her awards at the ASC conference in San Francisco in November and at the ACJS conference in Orlando in March. The book focuses on the role of women as offenders, victims, and justice professionals and examines global forces that shape women and crime. Barberet is director of the Master of Arts Degree Program in International Crime and Justice at John Jay College of Criminal Justice and was recently selected as the new editor of *Feminist Criminology*, the official journal of the ASC's Division on Women and Crime. She was recently elected to the Executive Committee of the International Sociological Association (ISA) at the XVIII ISA World Congress of Sociology, in Yokohama, Japan. As a multilingual scholar who has worked in both Europe and the United States, Barberet has consistently supported the internationalization of criminology and sociology.
